God's grace, peace, and hope be with you through our Savior, Jesus Christ.

Like rain after an endless drought, the gift of gathering in person this year has quenched a deep thirst. The pandemic revealed anew the depth of our thirst for community; Scripture also articulates this profound human need. Advances in technologies like livestreaming are indeed gifts to our church and world. Still, our hearts sing when we can rub shoulders around the communion table, embrace those who grieve, and raise our voices together in resounding song.

The mission of the synod is to support communities who share the thirst-quenching love of God – forming disciples, building beloved community, and working for just and healthy neighborhoods. I am deeply grateful for the many ways that we walk together in our journey of faith.

The synod staff walks closely in partnership with congregations, especially in times of transition, planning, or conflict. Last year, we accompanied congregations in 58 call processes. We offer skills trainings for lay members through the annual Tool Kit, and for church staff through peer groups and communicators gatherings. And, our Faith Practices & Neighborhood Practices program strengthens congregations in faith formation and engaging their neighborhoods.

Synod staff also work closely with our deacons and pastors. We experience great joy when we gather with congregations for ordinations, installations, and Ministry Site Profile reviews, as well as in preaching, presiding, and offering adult forums. We support our interim pastors who provide wise leadership in times of transition and our chaplains who provide critical care in a variety of settings. And, currently, we support 50 seminary students preparing to become pastors and deacons.

Our congregations worship in Spanish, Swahili, ASL, Oromo, Hmong, Lao, Norwegian, and Amharic. As we celebrate our diversity, we also recognize inequities affecting our congregations. Using a "racial equity lens," the synod council launched an in-depth process to evaluate and strengthen partnerships with our "strategic ministries," addressing historical realities of disconnection and resource inequities.

As a synod together, we will gather again April 28-29 for Synod Assembly. All are welcome at the opening worship Friday night; voting members will carry out the business of the synod on Saturday. We are blessed with the Rev. Dr. Otis Moss III as our keynote speaker.

Thanks to the incredible generosity of Lutherans in our synod and in the Lutheran Church of Christ in Nigeria, the ground-breaking for the first ever Lutheran University in Nigeria occurred this December. We celebrate God's provision and look forward to the blessings this university will bring.

During my sabbatical, I have been studying "the church in the U.S. – hopes and challenges." I would like to present some of my learnings as well as facilitate conversations in as many congregations as possible during the coming months. The congregation closed with meeting with The Lord's Prayer.


PASTOR NATHAN'S 2022 ANNUAL REPORT AND 2023 VISION AND PLAN

Dear Members and Friends of Elk River Lutheran Church,

Our church experienced major changes in 2022 and enters 2023 with great momentum for a fabulous year of life and ministry together. In this report, I walk through some of the most notable happenings of 2022 and share my hopes and excitement for 2023.

Worship

We entered 2022 in the midst of the Omicron wave of the covid pandemic, and so after returning to in-person/indoor worship for both 8:30 am & 10:30 am services in the fall of 2021, we started 2022 with very low in-person attendance. But I'm excited to report that as the world has opened up and we've learned to live with covid, we've seen a sizable and regular growth in worship attendance. We reopened our staffed nursery with Sonja Tesdahl, Emma Anderson, and Clara Anderson providing great care. Many musicians and ensembles have returned. And even as we worshiped in the Community Room for months during construction, there is a loving, joyful mood at our services. The chart of Sunday morning in-person attendance below shows a 300% increase in attendance from January to December. This really proved to be the year we returned from covid.



I share this information for two reasons:

- To celebrate these numbers, because these aren't just numbers, they're people, and I'm grateful that more and more people are coming together to experience worship and life together again.
- To serve as a reminder that we need to be intentionally welcoming, because at every service we have first time visitors and members who haven't attended worship in some time.

Even as we gather in person at the church we continue to have many people join us for **online worship**, including "watch party" groups at Riverview Landing in Otsego, MN, and our "ERLC South Campus" in Fountain Hills, AZ. I'm grateful for the excellent job Nick Campbell does putting out the online broadcast and for all of you who worship online. Online worship is an important ministry for our members and is our number one outreach tool, because since we started doing online worship, every (and I mean EVERY!) first-time visitor who comes through our doors has first checked us out online.

Transitions

Last spring we were sad to say goodbye to Jeremy Hallquist, who held a number of roles at Elk River Lutheran over the years: Minister of Congregational Care & Discipleship, Intern Pastor, and Interim Director of Children, Youth, and Family Ministry. Jeremy accepted his first call as a pastor and is serving as Associate Pastor at American Lutheran Church in Worthington, MN. His ordination at ERLC is one of my favorite memories at the church. I am thankful for Jeremy's ministry at ERLC and am grateful to count him as a great colleague and friend.

Last summer as Jeremy left for first call, Taylor Quinn, our Director of Music and

Worship, also left for a much-deserved sabbatical. Being short-staffed is never easy, but we had major projects happening in the summer of 2022: An active Call Committee, a Building Committee preparing for a major construction project, and we were gearing up for what would become our LOVE: Inside Out capital campaign. Linda Nielsen, our office manager, stepped up in major ways and helped hold this place together this summer as I was stretched so thin. Brian Harding, our custodian, and Lori Sundman, our bookkeeper, continue to provide excellent and faithful service to the church.

Our **Call Committee**, under the leadership of Sarah Chur, worked diligently and quickly to consider several candidates for our Associate Pastor position. We were thrilled to meet, interview, and ultimately vote unanimously to call Pastor Anne Schaefer. The months working with Pastor Anne have already been such a blessing and I look forward to many years of ministry together.

Building Project

A little less than two years ago I asked Adam Horner to chair our building project and over the last nineteen months the Building Committee, under his leadership, has put in a tremendous amount of work. Now we all get to benefit from that work with the upgraded new entrance and remodeled sanctuary. Thank you to the Building Committee and to everyone who has been flexible and supportive during construction.



Return to Hosting Community Events

In 2022 we got back to hosting some of my favorite events that we do for the community: Downtown Block Party, Thursdays at the Farmers Market, Downtown Trick-or-Treating and Trunk-or-Treat, and Santa in the Park. These events are great ways for us to live out our love for our neighborhood and the people in our community.

In Conclusion

We enter this new year seeing continued growth in worship attendance, having just completed our LOVE: Inside Out capital campaign, in a new worship space, and with a new pastor. What an exciting time to be Elk River Lutheran Church! Our goal with the building project was to make our building as welcoming as our people and we've done that, so now we need to continually be aware of how we welcome people and continue to be the joyful accepting community God has called us to be. Thank you for the continued opportunity to serve as pastor here at Elk River Lutheran.

LOVE: INSIDE OUT CAPITAL APPEAL

It was a pleasure to again work with Pastor Blair Anderson on a capital appeal at Elk River Lutheran. Our dedicated Capital Campaign Executive Team (including Chuck Anderson, Jim Ayres, Kari Christianson, Conni and John Natwick, Sue Sass, and myself) began meeting in June to plan and recruit the leadership who would fill out several teams of volunteers.

Our theme LOVE: Inside Out is a celebration of the work that has been completed inside the church, and a call to likewise improve the outside of our facility. We are the church Powered by Love and we want our members and the whole community to experience that love inside and outside of this place. LOVE: Inside Out also acknowledges the way we experience God's love inside ourselves, and our calling to live that love out, sharing it with the world.



Goals of the campaign include:

- Funding our debt, the mortgage and construction loan for the sanctuary.
- Tending to the stucco on the outside of the building, so we can have a building that looks good and welcoming, letting the community know we are proud to be here.
- Finish the outside work that we began dreaming about several years ago; reconfiguring the drive-thru for better traffic flow, adding a patio gathering space for our own members and the church to use, as well as the community at large, and finally, some street side signage and a cross to help people know that, YES, this is a church!

As of the printing of this report we had 114 households pledge \$710,885.99 to the building fund as a part of the 2023-2025 capital appeal and 103 households pledge \$305,998.00 to our general fund for our 2023 ministry appeal.

Thank you to the many, many people who volunteered and participated in the campaign and accompanying events. And thank you to everyone who pledged to this campaign. If you have not yet turned in a pledge card, it's not too late.

This campaign was always about more than just raising money, it is a celebration of our life together and an embrace of our vision for the future. May we continue to be blessed and experience God's LOVE Inside Out.

ADULT FAITH FORMATION


During Lent of 2022, we still weren't ready for the large group gatherings around Dinner Church services, so instead we did LIFE Groups, our sermon-based small groups. Several groups met in homes, online, or at the church to engage in conversation around themes from the previous week's sermon.

Our Men's Bible Study group continues to meet weekly on Saturday mornings via Zoom and our Women's Bible Study group meets monthly at the church. Both are great opportunities to explore the Bible, discuss life, and grow in faith.

Moving forward into 2023, we are excited about a new round of LIFE Groups at ERLC. We will have 6-8 small groups meeting at varied times to build community and discuss the previous week's sermon.

Another new ministry is coming to ERLC for 2023. It has yet to receive its official name, but the focus of ministry is to empower our community members to care for one another by visiting with and doing acts of service for our members who are dealing with mobility or health issues, grieving, or otherwise in need of the benefits of relationship. This will be a great opportunity for God's love to flow through each of us. Look for info and a chance to be part of this ministry soon!

We have had conversations with a few members and people who have helped to support Adult Faith Formation in the past about what may be ahead. There is energy for social justice, book studies and care for our communities. God is at work through our ERLC congregation, and we're looking forward to the year ahead.

ASSOCIATE PASTOR CALL COMMITTEE

The Elk River Lutheran Church Associate Pastor Call Committee was elected by the Church Council and officially commenced its work on Wednesday, March 23, 2022. The committee worked closely with the Minneapolis Area Synod to complete the ministry site profile and job description, identifying these top priorities for a new pastor:

- Build programs that integrate Children, Youth, and Family (CYF) into the life of the congregation.
- Get to know the congregation by building meaningful and collaborative relationships with members of all ages.
- Provide care and leadership for members unable to attend in person.
- Enhance the worship service experience by delivering joyful, inspirational, challenging, and thought-provoking messages.
- Engage with the Church's community partners (CAER, Farmer's Market, Downtown Association, etc.).

Following Bishop Svennungsen's visit with the congregation in early May, the Call Committee met with a representative of the Synod on May 18 and received the names of nine potential candidates. After careful consideration, initial interviews were held, and Pastor Anne Schaefer subsequently was invited for a second interview. The Call Committee identified Pastor Anne Schaefer as its final candidate and held a meet and greet event with the Church Council on June 21.

The Call Committee and Church Council unanimously recommended Pastor Anne for this call, and the congregation was invited to an ice cream social on July 20. The following Sunday, a special congregational meeting was held. On Sunday, July 24, by unanimous vote, Elk River Lutheran Church voted to extend the call of Associate Pastor to Pastor Anne Schaefer.

Pastor Anne's ordination was held on Thursday, September 1, and her first Sunday at Elk River Lutheran was September 25, 2022. The Call Committee is grateful for the support of the congregation and the Synod through this call process and is excited to have Pastor Anne as a partner in ministry at ERLC.

BUILDING COMMITTEE

2022 was a busy year for the Building Committee as we were in full-swing planning, designing, and realizing the transformation of ERLC's sanctuary and main entrance. The Building Committee would like to thank everyone for their generous support of the Powered by Love campaign and your flexibility and support during construction.



The design effort started in 2021, wrapped up in March of 2022, and was shared with the congregation at a special meeting in April. In May, Terra Construction initiated formal bidding which culminated in the construction proposal presented to the congregation in June. On June 26, the congregation overwhelming approved a motion to proceed with the \$660,000 construction project. The approved project consisted of \$620,000 for construction (remodeling and roof repairs) and \$40,000 for audio/visual upgrades.

Construction started just after Labor Day with demolition work at the new entry and in the sanctuary and quickly moved into construction and the roof replacement. Over the course of the fall, we all watched as the transformation of the sanctuary and entry took shape. Throughout the construction phase, the Building Committee worked closely with Terra and CNH Architects by meeting weekly to review progress, address issues, approve changes, and discuss upcoming activities. The team worked extremely hard to find creative ways to keep the project moving forward with the goal of having the sanctuary ready for Christmas services. Terra and their subcontractors realized this goal with a few days to spare by turning the sanctuary over to us on December 16th. Even though the sanctuary was not completely done, we were able to celebrate Christmas in our newly remodeled space.

Construction will wrap up in January 2023 with the arrival and installation of the remaining components. Due to audio and video equipment lead times, the audio and video updates will occur over the winter months and are planned to be completed in Spring 2023.



To recap, in 2022, the ERLC Building Committee:

- Developed the final design proposal with Terra Construction and CNH Architects
- Presented the final sanctuary and entry design to the Congregation in April 2022
- Supported the bidding process and received a final construction proposal in June 2022
- Presented the construction proposal for congregation approval on June 26, 2022
- Started construction in September 2022
- Re-selected the audio/video contractor and re-started the A/V design
- Coordinated with Terra and CNH to address construction issues, changes, and schedule challenges.
- Celebrated receiving the temporary certificate of occupancy on December 16, 2022.

Again, the Building Committee would like to thank all of you for your support, excellent input, and flexibility during this process. We are extremely happy to have been a part of this project and look forward to finishing up in early 2023.

CHILDREN, YOUTH AND FAMILY

LiFT

Confirmation

Students were excited to be part of this and are already looking forward to this event for 2023!

Confirmation Service

On October 30th, six 9th-grade students confirmed their Christian faith publicly during our worship service. We celebrated this great act of discipleship and look forward to where God may be leading each of them in the future.

High School

We have a passionate and excited group of high school students who gather most Wednesday nights for conversation, learning, and a ton of snacks. Though the pandemic slowed this area of ministry, the students who come are really engaged in their faith and this ERLC community. We have talked about a future which involves service projects, learning, and having fun together. Watch out, Church, this group is up to something special. All are welcome here.











CYF Nights

We started a new tradition at ERLC - monthly CYF Nights! These events are celebrated monthly and invite the whole family - all ages - to engage their faith through a meal, games, large group and small group activities, and conversations. We have about 65 people who come regularly to live into community here. Topics have included telling our story, gratefulness, and Christmas. Moving into the New Year we will wrestle with resolutions and mental health.

VBS

Vacation Bible School took place during a transition in CYF staff leadership (after Jeremy left, before Pastor Anne arrived), so Pastor Nathan was charged with making it happen. An amazing group of volunteers joined him in planning and leading VBS: Deb Fasanello, Audrey Horner, Janelle Katzner, Sheila Larson, and Sue Sass. They worked hard, were fun, and made VBS an exciting, memorable experience for our kids. Sue Sass (along with her assistant Ron ①) and a group of decorators transformed the church into a beach party to match our Make Waves theme using decorations Linda Nielsen had procured from other churches. Rachel Kurtz brought her talent and energy leading music for the Sunday mornings corresponding with VBS as well as the mid-week gatherings. VBS was held on

four different days: Two Sundays, which included regular worship and a time following the services concluding with lunch, and two midweek gatherings that started with dinner. Thank you to everyone who helped with everything from grilling hotdogs to wearing shark suits. We had a great week "making waves."















HOSPITALITY TEAM

The mission of the ERLC Hospitality Team is to create an atmosphere of love, fellowship, and community. Some of the ways we carry this out are by coordinating and hosting Sunday Fellowship Coffee hour, serving member and Dare funeral luncheons, and other food-related events. In addition, we maintain the kitchen and Café areas and purchase all paper products, condiments, coffee, and lemonade, as needed.





In 2022, we served lunches for 14 funerals, six were ERLC members, and eight coordinated with

Dare's Funeral Home. Several members of Hospitality stepped up to assist in serving during the Capital Campaign. We assisted with Lenten suppers, the Block Party in May, and prepared and served treats during Bible School. We hosted our Annual Pie Sunday in November which is always a huge success. In December we hosted a "Christmas Goodie Sunday".

During construction, we readily adjusted to serving coffee and doughnuts in the lower level as we worshiped in the Community room. During this time the coffee machine was moved to the kitchen in the lower level. We then ordered a new Bunn Coffee Brewer for the Cafe. It was installed in the last week of December.

MUSIC MINISTRY

In 2022 the music ministry stayed pretty consistent from beginning to end. While the church was gearing up for the sanctuary remodel and I was preparing to take my sabbatical, the musicians continued to serve God, you, and the Elk River community with their gifts.

- A couple of special groups participated in our Easter worship services. We enjoyed the music

- Our first rehearsal in the new sanctuary was on Dec 19th!

Now we look forward to 2023 in our brand new remodeled sanctuary. It's exciting to have a roomier chancel for the musicians. It's also exciting to think about the new sound system that'll be installed soon. I'm looking forward to growing the music ministry in our new space, with hopes of fine-tuning the current ensembles, creating more opportunities for musicians, and possibly bringing in outside groups to share their music with us.

I'm so glad to have a chance to reflect on 2022 with you. May God be experienced even more in 2023.





We began the year working with the building committee on storage for worship supplies that will be needed in the new space. We reviewed the instructions for volunteers. TREASURER'S REPORT

This was the year we moved away from the pandemic years and into our full programming year. It was also the year we moved forward with our new entry and sanctuary improvements. We began with our LOVE: In and Out capital appeal to fund our ministry together for the years 2023, 2024 and 2025. It was a busy year with several projects moving at one time. We said goodbye to Jeremy Hallquist and welcomed Pastor Anne Schaefer. I want to add that our staff was exceptional in keeping us under budget for our spending and yet delivered a very robust year in all areas of ministry at ERLC.

The 2020, 2021, 2022 "Powered by Love" capital campaign allowed ERLC to pay its mortgage debt and to complete the building improvements planned. When the contractor bids were completed, we discovered the estimates that were communicated in the "Powered by Love" campaign were not going to allow us to move forward with the improvement projects. By a congregational vote, the congregation decided to borrow up to an additional \$250,000.00 to complete the two phases of the project. The final numbers for the "Powered by Love" campaign are \$817,170.50 pledged and \$752,131.10 given. We successfully secured a loan from Mission Investment Funds (MIF). MIF holds our main mortgage for the building.

Our reserved funds and building funds reflect significant decreases in balances as a good portion of the monies held in reserve were for the building improvements and roof repairs. These accounts should recover as ERLC receives the contributions pledged for the "LOVE: Inside Out" capital campaign. At the end of the year, the Council conveyed that our overall giving in 2022 projected a \$21,000.00 deficit. We communicated this to the congregation and I'm very happy to report the congregation responded, and we ended the year in the black in the amount of \$4,270.22. A big thank you for this response!

To keep our momentum going as a congregation, we are projecting an increase in budget expenditures, which means we will need to keep up our giving to meet this budget. You will see monthly updates in the weekly bulletins and newsletters. If we pull together as one church family, I'm confident that this congregation will meet the challenge.

I will be leaving the Council and Treasurer's position once my replacement comes back from warmer climates. It has been a pleasure to serve ERLC in this capacity.
