Day by day ... they ate their food <u>with</u> <u>glad and generous hearts</u>, praising God and having the good will of all the people. – Acts 2:46-47

In May, we meet for our 2024 Synod Assembly under the the the Canad and Generous Hearts." The phrase describes the early church as they gathered on Pentecost. It is also an appropriate description of the past year of our life and ministry together.

In 2023, our hearts were gladdened by:

- Your congregation, along with the other 136 congregations in our synod, faithfully proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus Christ in Word and Sacrament, nurturing community, and loving neighbors and neighborhoods.
- The privilege of accompanying congregations in 72 Call Processes; presiding at 14 Ordinations and 30 Installations; and walking with 34 people preparing to become pastors or deacons.
- 142 lay leaders and 28 clergy from 31 congregations learning to be church in the 21st century through our Faith Practices and Neighboring Practices intensive learning communities.
- 6,500 people receiving our weekly enews. (Sign up at mpls-synod.org/sign-up to feel more connected.)
- 100s of rostered and lay leaders involved in synod sponsored peer groups, conferences, and retreats.
- 100s of leaders from synod congregations helping pass the state's "100% Clean Energy By 2040" and "Restore The Vote" legislation that advance both climate justice and racial justice.
- 100s of leaders faithfully serving as Deans, on Synod Council, and Candidacy, Audit, Program Committees.
- 15 gifted and devoted synod staff members: 10 funded by Mission Support from you and other congregations, and 5 funded by Lilly Endowment and other external grants.

We praise God for the congregational generosity that makes all this happen. At the same time, we recognize that mission support from congregations has declined 16% over the past 10 years, resulting in a reduction in synod staff hours. Especially as we prepare to elect a new bishop this spring, we invite you to consider strengthening your support for the future of the synod's work.

Conference Assemblies are just around the corner: Saturday, February 10, 9:30 a.m. – Noon. Of particular importance will be conference nominations for bishop as well as for voting members to the ELCA Churchwide Assembly, July 28 - August 2, 2025. We encourage congregations to send the same voting members to both the Conference and Synod Assemblies.

As we look at declining mission support or grieve the closing of a congregation, we can become discouraged. In such moments, I encourage you to listen to a remarkable conversation from our 2023 Synod Assembly. Our keynote speaker, the Rev. Otis Moss III, was asked: "what do you say to those who think the church is dying?" Filled with courage and hope, Moss responded, "the church is not dying, it is being born, refashioned, and remade. The early church was an alternative community. Today we use the metrics of the market to evaluate the church – buildings, budgets, numbers. But, the early church looked at *impact*: were people hearing the good news of Jesus who lived and died for our salvation?

Was suffering being relieved? Were people being welcomed and healed?" (mpls-synod.org/our-synod/synod-assembly-2/2023-synod-assembly-archives 4:57:27 of the second day)

Rev. Moss reminds us that we are called to be alternative communities. What might it take to measure our churches by *impact*? The work of synod leadership is to support the 137 communities and the thousands of leaders who are making an *impactful* difference in the 21st century: sharing the good news of Jesus, extending radical welcome into beloved community, engaging their neighborhoods in love with justice.

I am filled with both gratitude and sadness as I write this, my final annual report to congregations. I have loved serving as your bishop and am profoundly grateful for this calling. We pray for the year ahead, trusting in the goodness and faithfulness of our God, made known in Jesus Christ.

PASTOR NATHAN'S 2023 ANNUAL REPORT AND 2024 VISION AND PLAN

Dear Members of Elk River Lutheran,

As I think about the year 2023, the theme that comes to my mind is "**Creation**." We celebrated a number of baptisms this year and in that service there is a prayer that harkens back to the creation story in Genesis 1 proclaiming, "We give you thanks, O God, for in the beginning your Spirit moved over the waters and by your Word you created the world, calling forth life in which you took delight." (ELW Hymnal pg 230) The Spirit has been moving here at Elk River Lutheran and I give thanks for these ways we've experienced God's creation and new life together this year, including:

- The completion of our major building project, which has provided us with a wonderfully welcoming new main entrance and a modern, beautiful, comfortable worship space. I give thanks for these ways we have made our building as welcoming as our people.
- Deepening connections with the community by further partnering with other downtown businesses, the city, and by welcoming more outside groups to use our space, including a new AA recovery group meeting every Tuesday evening.
- Growth in programs and worship attendance (This Christmas we had over six hundred people attend services at Elk River Lutheran!).
- Providing space and opportunities for our members to foster meaningful relationships and support one another within the joys and heartaches of life.

For all of the life and new life we have been able to delight in this year, I echo the faith of Ezra the priest from the Old Testament who said, "You are the Lord, you alone; you have made heaven, the heaven of heavens, with all their host, the earth and all that is on it, the seas and all that is in them. To all of them you give life, and the host of heaven worships you." (Nehemiah 9:6)

The Financial Challenges of Full Ministry

This was the first "normal" year of church programming with a full staff in many years and so that meant a year full of wonderful opportunities, ministry, and connections, but it also meant a more full year of expenses. When this financial challenge was shared with the congregation this fall, members of the church stepped up. Thank you. Because of your generous giving and the one time Employee Retention Credit (a Covid era Federal credit we received in 2023), we were able to finish the year on solid financial footing.



My Sabbatical, Creativity, and God's Creation I connected with the theme of "Creation" on a personal level in 2023 as well, as I studied and explored creative writing, stand-up comedy, and how to more effectively communicate in preaching and in general. Of course, my sabbatical was a big part of my experience of this year as well. I am so thankful to you all for this opportunity, and especially to the church council for approving my specific proposal, and to the staff for stepping up in my absence. I realize it was a lot to put on Pastor Anne in her first year here, but unsurprisingly, she stepped into the leadership role with grace and aptitude.

The notion of sabbatical and weekly times of sabbath comes right out of that original creation story which ends like this: "On the sixth day God finished the work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all the work that he had done. So God blessed the seventh day and hallowed it, because on it God rested from all the work that he had done in creation." (Genesis 2:2-3)



I am thankful for the regular opportunities for rest and time with family, but this sabbatical was the rare, uninterrupted chance for me to do some deeper study, unplug, and be completely available for my family as we experienced the great adventure of a six week, eight thousand mile road trip and time together at home. Our tour of the Western part of our country provided a wonderful view of the vastness of God's creation, prompting me to echo the words of the psalmist, "O LORD, how manifold are your works! In wisdom you have made them all; the earth is full of your creatures." (Psalm 104:24)

I understand that not everyone has the opportunity for a sabbatical, so I thank you for this time. It's my hope and prayer that even if you can't take a full three month sabbatical, you find times of regular rest, renewal, and sabbath; opportunities for adventure, time with family and friends, and the exploration of God's vast creation.



Looking To 2024

Starting with the pandemic in 2020 it became difficult to set goals and plan very far into the future. Coming out of the most difficult months and years of the pandemic we moved into our building project and transitioned pastoral leadership, as we welcomed Pastor Anne. We enter this new year in a strong position, having completed the building project and with a full, competent, and established staff. I believe that now is the time to once again do some self-examination and visioning for the future. My and the council's hope is that we can do some leadership training/coaching with the staff and council, to help us meet the challenges of a changing culture by taking advantage of the opportunities that also lie before us.

As I worked to identify goals for this new year, informed by areas of focus identified by our staff and council, I was drawn back to these three words that structured our goals several years ago: Communication, Connection, and Community.

Communication - We will perform a communications audit to ensure we are effectively communicating with our members and the greater community.

Connections - We will offer programs for people of all ages to provide opportunities for members to foster meaningful relationships, support one another, and enjoy life together. **Community** - We will love and serve our neighbors through specific programs and events, volunteering and supporting social service agencies like CAER and LSS, and by simply being a loving presence in our downtown neighborhood.

If we can live into these goals with intention and care, I know that 2024 will be another wonderful year of life and ministry together.

Thank you for all the ways you've given of yourself to love and support Elk River Lutheran Church. Thank you, again, for the opportunity of the sabbatical. AND thank you for continuing to put our mission statement into action:

Trusting in God's grace, an accepting, joyful community, serving God and neighbor.

TEAM ANNUAL REPORTS AND HIGHLIGHTS

ADULT FAITH FORMATION

2023 was a big year for our Adult Faith Formation ministry! We kept some existing ministries and added new ones as well!

DEI/Social Justice Task Force:

On October 8th we installed our new task force for diversity, equity, inclusion and social justice. They are helping us to stay current with our commitment to our Reconciled in Christ (RIC) identity, and they will also be looking for ways that we can live out that identity in the world around us. We are grateful for their passion and call to work for justice.



Text Study:

We restarted our weekly text study group that discusses the upcoming preaching text with the preaching pastor. We ask simple questions like, "what does this make you think about;" "what questions do you have after reading it;" "what do you want to know more about;" and even "why might we care about this?" There is no prior experience or homework required at all. Some people shared much and others hardly shared at all...all are welcome!

Civil Rights Tour:

Once in June and once in July, we welcomed Pastor Joanne Sorenson from *In Our Hands Adventures* who got a group of people excited for a tour of major civil rights sites and memorials. 22 of our people quickly signed up for this tour that will happen in April of 2024. The tour is designed to be a pilgrimage for those searching for meaning and desiring personal transformation.



LiFE Groups (Living In Faith Everyday):

We had LiFE Group programming twice in 2023. This happened once in the winter and then again in the fall. LiFE Groups are a ministry where the pastors help coordinate people into small groups for weekly gatherings. At each gathering, the group looks at the previous Sunday's preaching text and responds to questions about the sermon or the topic



of the day. Groups enjoy connection, honest conversation, and often snacks! We had 7 different groups with over 60 participants. A new round of LiFE Groups will happen again in April of 2024.

Regular Studies and Gatherings:

We launched a new monthly women's Bible study that takes place at Guardian Angels Riverview Landing. This is led by Pastor Linda Campbell and has 8-12 people there each time. Ongoing ministries also kept their regular meetings including a monthly women's Bible study, weekly men's and women's breakfasts, and a weekly men's Bible study on Zoom. There always seems to be a group meeting for fellowship, Bible study, or task-based reasons. We are thankful for a community that likes to gather.

BUILDING COMMITTEE

The Building Committee saw the culmination of the *Powered by Love* campaign in 2023 with the completion of the sanctuary remodeling project. After celebrating our first Christmas in the nearly complete sanctuary in 2022, the Building Committee started 2023 by working through final construction punch list items with Terra Construction and their subcontractors. The final upgrade of the project completed in late March when the new sound system components finally arrived. Reach Communications was onsite to complete installation and training just in time to celebrate Easter in April. As a congregation, we celebrated a special service of dedication on June 4, 2023, where we blessed the new sanctuary space and entry and celebrated everyone's efforts with a reception.

As we live into our new space, we find small issues that need to be addressed. Greg Pouliot and others from the Building Committee have continued to work through these items with Terra Construction, Landmark Electric, and others. These kinds of items are expected; Terra Construction has been great in helping to get those issues resolved.

Sanctuary and Entry Remodel Timeline:

- Developed the final design proposal with Terra Construction and CNH Architects in Q1 2022
- Presented the final sanctuary and entry design to the Congregation in April 2022
- Supported the bidding process and received a final construction proposal in June 2022
- Presented the construction proposal for congregation approval on June 26, 2022
- Started construction in September 2022
- Re-selected the audio/video contractor and re-started the A/V design
- Coordinated with Terra and CNH to address construction issues, changes, and schedule challenges, fall 2022b
- Celebrated receiving the temporary certificate of occupancy on December 16, 2022
- Celebrated Christmas in the new sanctuary, December 2022
- Completed A/V installation and final punch list items in March 2023
- Celebrated our first Easter with all sanctuary systems operational, April 2023
- Dedicated the renovated sanctuary and entry on June 4, 2023

The Building Committee would like to thank everyone at ERLC for their support, inputs and flexibility during the planning and construction process. We are extremely happy with the results and look forward enjoying this space for years to come.

CHILDREN, YOUTH AND FAMILY

PreK through 6th Grade Students

Each Sunday, kids come to worship with their families, but they get to leave during the scripture reading and sermon time in order to engage with their peers in a lesson more fitting to their age group. The number one goal of this time is to show kids that they matter to God and this congregation. We use Bible Stories to help teach this in a variety of ways. We played games, did crafts, read stories and talked a lot about Jesus. Students have a good time coming to Kids Connect! Pastor Anne writes most of the curriculum, and either Pastor Anne or a volunteer leads the lessons. The volunteer roster is small, so we are desperately needing more volunteers to help out in the months ahead.

We also gathered students in grades 4, 5, and 6 to have a few fun nights at the church. We hung out in order to build community, eat yummy food and just play. Students ran around to play the games and learned of all the best hiding spots in the building. They also learned that the church is a place accessible to each of them exactly as they are.

We recognized a few milestones with some of our young people as well. 14 students celebrated their 1st Holy Communion, and 7 third grade students received a new Bible and learned how to use them! It is an honor to watch our young people grow within this community of faith.





CYF Nights

Our monthly events for our Children, Youth and Families are called CYF Nights, and they have been a lot of fun for everyone. Each night, we eat a meal together, have large group time where we do an icebreaker, sing some songs, and listen to a speaker. We usually end the evening in a small group where we go deeper into the topic or theme of the night. One of the most memorable CYF Nights from 2023 is when JustMove (Joe Davis and Dave Scherer) came out to sing, rap, dance and speak to us about inclusion, diversity, and antiracism. It was a fantastic night! Some of our other themes included The One Thing (January), Mental Health (February), Advent (November) and Serving our Neighbors (April) where we made 621 sandwiches for area food ministries. The goal of these nights is to grow in our faith and grow closer to God and each other. They have done this and so much more!



VBS

In August, we celebrated that we are all called to be heroes for Jesus in Hero Headquarters VBS. It was an exciting time to welcome 24 students in PreK through 6th grade. Each of the four sessions



included a full meal, games, activities, songs, skits, crafts, and a service project for our real-world heroes. We made cards for the firefighters and EMTs, made a thank-you poster with our handprints for the police station, sent cards to the emergency medical teams at Mercy Hospital, and donated many pounds of food to CAER Food Shelf.

We could not have pulled off this incredible week without the help of many volunteers. We had 25 people gather to build our set and decorate the space, and then another 22 volunteers to work

face to face with the kiddos during the program week. It takes a village to pull off an amazing week like this, and ERLC absolutely rose to the challenge!

Confirmation

On most Wednesday nights throughout the school year Pastor Nathan can be found teaching a wonderful group of twenty Confirmation students in the Community Room. These seventh and eighth graders are spending the 2023-2024 Confirmation year studying the stories of the Old Testament. We spend time learning the stories and what they have to teach us about who God is and who we are as people, we enjoy small group time exploring the story themes and getting to know each other more, AND we also have a lot of fun playing games and being silly.

Confirmation Service

On October 29th, eleven 9th grade students confirmed their Christian faith publicly during our worship service. We celebrated this great act of discipleship and look forward to where God may be leading each of them in the future. 
Summer Bible Camp

GENEROSITY TEAM

HOSPITALITY TEAM

The Hospitality Team consists of nine members. Our mission is to create an atmosphere of fellowship and community. We serve all areas of food related events for Elk River Lutheran Church and provide seasonal decorations and table centerpieces. We maintain the Café and fellowship area (first floor) and the community room tables and kitchen (lower level). We monitor and purchase supplies such as coffee, lemonade, table coverings and paper products. Some of the ways we serve are:

- **Sunday morning Fellowship Hour** serving coffee and doughnuts. This is supported through donations from the congregation.
- We served 9 member **funeral luncheons** and 13 luncheons for Dare Funeral Home in 2023, providing a welcoming and caring atmosphere for the families and friends of the deceased. Each luncheon, depending on size, requires three to six volunteers plus the coordinator and up to five hours of service for each luncheon.
- We set up and served Ash Wednesday soup supper and dinner church throughout Lent
- Assisted with the food service for the Block Party in May.
- Assisted with the prep, serving and cleanup of the meals for Vacation Bible School.
- Coordinated and hosted **Pie Sunday in November**, serving pies brought by members of the congregation.
- Coordinated and hosted Heritage Sunday in December, inviting members to bring special treats indicative of their heritage.
- Assisted CYF with meals when needed. The pizza and hot chocolate bar was a big hit
 in December.

 We also help members to celebrate special events such as milestone birthdays, anniversaries, etc.

We welcome new team members. We meet the first Monday of the month at 10 am. If interested in becoming a team member or just want to occasionally help serve coffee on Sunday mornings, please contact Linda Nielsen, ERLC Office Manager or Co-Chairs: Barb Overbye or Gwen Krizek.

MISSION ENDOWMENT FUND

After the generous gift from the Patten Family in 2016, the Mission Endowment Committee became active in 2018.

As we worked to recover from COVID and rejuvenate the committee, we found 2023 a quiet year for the Endowment Committee. The committee has been discussing ways to let people know how to support the mission of ERLC through the Endowment Fund. We are always open to hear of new and different groups in our community to contribute to. We were able to award two disbursements for the year. We gifted \$1,000 to Lutheran University Nigeria through the Minneapolis Area Synod of the ELCA. We also funded Financial Peace University for up to 20 interested households at a cost of \$1,498 including childcare as needed during the classes.

A gift of \$3,839.50 was received from a member's estate in March of 2022. Past grants have been given to CAER, ERLC for Financial Peace University, ISD #728 School Lunch Debt Relief program, Thumbs Up, and Open Doors for Youth.





MUSIC MINISTRY

We were all so excited to start 2023 in our new sanctuary. Although the new sound system hadn't been installed yet and there were a few finishing touches left to do, we were anticipating a great year in the space. All the ensembles began their rehearsals there. Each prepared for their appearances in upcoming services. Here are some stats from each ensemble.













The **Choir** appeared 12 times in our services and ended the year with 27 singers in the roster. They rehearsed on Thursdays. Similar to the Ringers, they performed a solo song and led one or two congregational hymns for each service they appeared in. A significant thing that happened to the choir was the loss of two members: Ron Stricker and Jim Acers. Both passed away in the Fall. They were beloved, talented and skilled in music, and are still greatly missed. Highlights for the choir was singing with the Worship Band and participating in the all the hymn sings.

The **Instrumental Ensemble** appeared twice in the Fall. They performed and led hymns for *Music Sunday* and *Christmas Eve*. They rehearsed on Sunday or Wednesdays. By the end of the year their roster was up to 13 members. A highlight for them was adding two clarinets, a trumpet, trombone, and tuba.

Besides the regular ensembles, the music ministry offered many **community events** throughout the year. In May, we had a hymn-sing at Varty's greenhouse event. In the summer, the Kaleidoscope Quartet sang in our services and performed a concert. We also gathered 65 members of our congregation to sing the National Anthem at a Twins game in August. The Fall was a busy season for community events with two hymn sings at Guardian Angels By the Lake, a hymn-sing at Riverview Landing, and the Autumn HymnFest in October. The Christmas season brought three caroling events. In mid-November, twenty-five carolers led carols at the Downtown

Christmas tree lighting, thiry-one carolers provided music during the Santa in the Park event, and fourteen carolers joined the Riverside Ringers for the Bells & Carols event at Riverview Landing.

A few highlights for me in 2023 was implementing "Town Hall Forums" for the musicians, getting more families involved in the music ministry, leading music during CYF nights, having some time off on Sundays, and leading Lessons & Carols with Lisa at the end of the year.

2023 was filled with many enriching ways to connect our musicians.

QUILTING TEAM

As part of our outreach, the ERLC quilters made 158 quilts and 76 School Kits/Backpacks this year for our mission. The quilts and schoolbags make a real difference in the lives of those who receive them. We could not fulfill the Elk River Lutheran Church's Mission without the help from our congregation. We are grateful for them.

March was National Quilting Month and we had 88 quilts blessed. The quilts were donated to Lutheran World Relief. LWR distributes about 300,000 Mission Quilts a year to people who have endured war, natural disasters, economic strife, drought and other crises. Some of those crises make the headlines, many more never do. But everyone who receives a quilt gets a jolt of love and encouragement.

June we wrapped a quilt around our graduating seniors as they continue on their life journey.

September 24 was a very special day for our quilters. We celebrated 10 years of quilting and our congregation supporting us with fabric, sheets, batting, supplies, and cash donations for shipping and supplies. We blessed 68 quilts and 69 School Kits/Backpacks. With the help of the evening Bible Study Group and other members, school backpacks were filled with basic school supplies and given to LWR. It allows children in need to attend schools with their tools & backpacks.

After our celebration someone from the Hospitality Team asked if the quilters would make something for the back of the wood divider in the lower level. A group of 5 quilters created a hanging from the donated fabric.

July, September, and December we donated a total of 18 quilts, 2 quilts a month to Lutheran Social Service Refugee Services which offers hope and a helping hand to refugees as they start anew in Minnesota.

Our group has grown to 13 quilters and everyone is welcome to join us. We meet every Tuesday at 9 a.m. until around 11:00 a.m. You don't have to be a seamstress to join us. Come check us out in the lower level of the church.

LOVE INSIDE OUT CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE

Thank you to everyone who has pledged and given to the 2023-2025 LOVE Inside Out Capital Appeal! We have received <u>117</u> pledges totaling <u>\$708,277.99</u>. To date we have received <u>\$274,920.23</u>. The current Building Fund balance is \$195,009.27.

Below you'll find the stated goals of the campaign. To date we have continued to make mortgage payments from the Building Fund with these donated dollars, which allows General Fund money to support the day to day ministry of the church. As soon as this summer we may begin looking at the Redashing (repair) of the Exterior Stucco! Again, thank you for your generous support of this campaign and the ways it will help our church and the community experience God's LOVE inside and out.



LOVE Inside Out Capital Appeal Goal - \$850,000

\$220,000 - Outdoor Beautification & Signage to Improve Our Visibility

- Install updated streetside signage and a large cross to communicate to the entire Elk River community "WE ARE A CHURCH!"
- Reconfiguring the drive-thru to provide better traffic flow and pickup/dropoff space.
- Create our envisioned patio space on Main Street for congregational and community use.

\$130,000 - Principal Buy-Down

 Prepayment of our mortgage will allow us to free up additional funds for ministry and mission.





TREASURER'S REPORT

The Council thanks you for the financial support so generously given over the years and especially this past year. This congregation responded well to appeals to catch up on pledges, so that income and specifically giving were close to expectations. Unfortunately, we've seen increased expenses this past year requiring us to consider cuts in some expenses.

We received a one-time Covid-era grant of \$132,000 called the Employee Retention Credit (ERC) in 2023. We utilized \$47,500 to balance the 2023 books and propose using \$39,500 in the 2024 budget. This use will only be utilized if needed toward the end of the year. We are earning a good amount in short-term interest with the balance.

In the budgeting process your Council looked at many variables. We think you will agree our best asset is our incredible staff, so we have included a cost of living pay increase of 3% for them. In trimming where we can, we were left with choices to reduce our Synod contribution, cut staff positions, or utilize part of the ERC grant to balance the budget, which we propose to use ERC funds.

Future use of the ERC grant may include contributions to the Deferred Maintenance Reserve Fund, the Community Outreach Dedicated Funds, and a financial systems audit, with the balance to the Operating Reserve Fund.

We have received \$274,920.23 (~39%) of pledges in the first year of the 2023-2025 Love Inside Out Capital Campaign. Thanks to all for your dedication to this! It will allow the Council to maintain our mortgage commitments and we are well on our way to funding the next building improvement phase. We did receive 92.5% of pledges for the Powered by Love Capital Campaign. We have about \$1,353,000 principal balance in our 2 mortgages.

This is certainly an exciting time in this Church. Our staff has proposed inspired plans for inclusion, community involvement, and congregational support. I am confident that we will continue to financially support these efforts.
